RECTOR'S REFLECTION

Dear People of Trinity Church:

As we approach the great fifty days of Easter, the principal festival of the Church Year and the celebration of Jesus Christ's new life and victory over death, we might look forward a few weeks to the Third Sunday of Easter when we pray that God will "open the eyes of our faith, that we may behold the risen Christ in all his redeeming work." Much in this issue of *Chimes* will be very good news, and much, I hope, will be eye-opening and inviting for you.

Trinity's remarkable *In the Garden* Sunday worship and fellowship marks its first birthday on Palm Sunday. What a joy so many in our parish community have brought to hundreds of women, men, and (yes!) children who live on the land or under bridges each night and have so little in life. You have shared deeply with them, and we thank God for your constant and creative work.

A letter from the House of Bishops of The Episcopal Church concerning the needs of some of the world's poorest people - our Caribbean neighbors in Haiti - signals our prayers this Holy Week and Easter in a compelling way. We will learn more about this struggle for justice, and ways Trinity can respond, as we celebrate resurrection life together in the next several weeks.

As Christians proclaim the wonder of God's salvation in Easter, and neighboring Jewish families re-tell the story of salvation in Exodus, we are reminded of Moses who gave voice to God's word and told the people who had experienced freedom and new possibilities: "Take from among you an offering to the Lord; let whoever is of grateful and generous heart bring the Lord's offering..." (Exodus 35:4-5.) This Easter, in the midst of economic challenges and loss across the nation and around the world, we stand ready to hear the stories of redemption, restoration, and resurrection in clearer ways. And we greet the risen Christ with hearts enlarged to give to all in need.

Life proceeds death in our faith. Joy conquers despair. And love wins! To God be all glory!

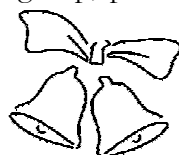

...approximately 10,000 foreclosures occurred in Franklin County in 2008 affecting 100,000 people

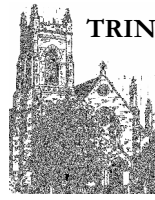
...one in 25 adults in Ohio are under the control of the criminal justice system either in jail, on probation, on parole or under supervision

FUTURE TRINITY UPDATE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ at Trinity Church;

As I write to you it is the Tuesday before Holy Week. We are still in the Season of Lent, but this coming Sunday is Palm and Passion Sunday and we will focus once again on the story of Jesus' humble, yet triumphal, entry on the back of a donkey into Jerusalem to shouts of "Hosanna!" Then suddenly the story will turn dark, and we'll see Judas' act of betrayal, hear the cheers turn to jeers, and be present once again at Jesus' arrest and death by crucifixion. But, as we well know, this is not the end of the story. God writes another chapter to this story, one that proclaims Christ's victory over death through the resurrection and the empty tomb.

Through Baptism we are inheritors of Christ's resurrection. By the power of God's Grace offered through our Lord Jesus we are drawn into the story and made victors with Christ over the powers of Sin and death. God has rewritten our story. The finality of death is replaced with the promise of eternal life. At the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday Eve two individuals, new to

our community, will step forward to receive the Sacrament of Baptism and be welcomed by us into the body of Christ. And this shall be a sign for us, that God is still speaking through the Holy Spirit, rewriting the story, removing the obstacle of death, and opening it up to life everlasting.

This spring 'Future Trinity', through the collaborative work of the 'Future Trinity Visioning Board', has been thinking about our story. We have been trying to envision what Trinity Church will be like in 2019, and using the freedom we have in God to imagine all kinds of possibilities for our ministry, not just in the future but in the present as well. But the story of Easter reminds me that we must be open to those possibilities, and not re-enforce the obstacles that would get in the way of their realization. When we're presented with what's possible and we offer pessimism – "We tried that once and it didn't work" – or obstinacy based on fear of change – "We've never done it that way before" – we are forgetting what God did in the victory over death. Mary Magdalene did not recognize Jesus standing in the Garden on Easter morning because she

couldn't see past the idea that he was, or could be, anything else but dead (John 20:11-15). But when she heard Jesus speak her name, "Mary", the obstacle of death was broken and the light of new life and new possibilities in Jesus broke in.

As The Future Trinity Visioning Board continues its work through Eastertide, we will not only be asking "What's possible?", but "What's stopping us?" -- "What is preventing us from making the journey from here to there?" Then, once we've identified those obstacles, we'll offer them to God, remembering that what seems impossible for us is not impossible for God.

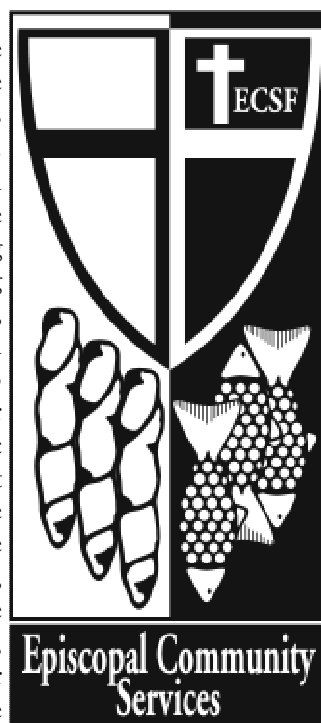
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DO GOOD. BAKE CHOCOLATE:
