## RECTOR'S REFLECTION

— THE REV. RICHARD A. BURNETT

On Easter Day, I preached about the connection that all who are baptized into Christ's death and resurrected life have with the strangers - "the aliens" - in our midst. I recalled the old line: "To the Christian, water is thicker than blood;" and invited us, by virtue of our life in the eternal waters of Christ's new life and in the glow of his new light, to seek the immigrant/migrant in our local setting, trusting that the resurrection moment at the heart of that encounter will be redemptive, and in that fellowship God's will will be done on earth, as we beg each day.

Since that Sunday, I've read some stretching and memorable things sent to me by others who care deeply as Christians about our love of neighbor and the stranger in our midst. Tim Morgan, posting on a blog (I really can't quite settle into quoting from blogs! But here goes...) says, "I'm not looking for a bumper sticker answer a public policy strategy or a Sunday School lesson about caring for the poor." But asking the basic baptismal/Easter question, What would Jesus do about undocumented immigrant adults and their children, he offers a multiple choice possibility.

- A. Look to Washington for a solution
- B. Call INS
- C. Invite them to a worship service
- D. Visit them
- E. Meet their needs
- F. All of the above
- G. None of the above

On Easter Day, I offered four actions I hope practice in the Fifty Days of the Easter Season (and beyond) that will bear the waters of Christ's baptism and the glow of resurrection light in the places of greatest uncertainty, loss, and loneliness for many. Would you join me this Easter in:

- 1) Prayer for the immigrant, the refugee, the migrant, the prisoner, the captive, and the lost person in our midst? You might want to start with the Prayer for the Oppressed (Book of Common Prayer, p.826) or the Prayer of Thanksgiving for the Diversity of Races and Cultures (Book of Common Prayer, p. 840.) Both help get you into forming your own prayer more fully each day.
- 2) Introduce yourself to that person - telling your name and the wonderful stories you know of your immigrant elders who preceded you to this nation we love so deeply? And hear that person's own story, learn her name and the name of her family members, and call her your new friend in Christ?
- 3) Offer a sign of direct hospitality to the new friend Christ has given to you? Cook her a meal that is generous and beautiful and festive, stand with her in court or at the employment office, sing and pray with her in church, pay her or her child's legal fee as you are able? Spend a holiday she celebrates with her and her child?

- 4) Learn as much about the pressing and complex issue of Humane Immigration Reform as you can this Easter Season (or longer) by visiting [www.interfaithimmigration.org](http://www.interfaithimmigration.org),

Two days following Easter Day - Tuesday in Easter Week, April 14th - the lead editorial in The New York Times ended this way; "It will take courage to defend the wisdom and necessity of fixing the immigration system. It will take even more courage to engage in the serious fight to do so." Courage is at the heart of the resurrection story. The waters that are truly "thicker than blood" for us can be frightful and unsettling. But they are our salvation because in them - and in and by Christ's death and resurrection - we become family with all who are alone, all who are despised, all who are easily forgotten, all who cry for hope and the dignity of a fresh start and a home.

Newsweek's Fareed Zakaria puts the issue in more secular yet no less compelling terms in his recent exploration of globalization and nationalism, The Post-American World (2008). Writing on the immigration debate, he bluntly say, "On an issue where the United States has been a model for the world, the country has regressed toward an angry defensive crouch." And further he suggests that, "Generations from now, when historians write about these times, they might note that, in the early decades of the twenty-first century, the United States succeeded in its great and historic mission - it globalized the world. But along the way, they might write, it forgot to globalize itself."

This Easter, may we hold to the resurrection truths of faith, hope, and love. May we bear and offer courage inspired by the Apostolic witness we share. May we come to know the stranger and her children in our midst in a real and lasting way. And in all this may we never forget that in practices of prayer, friendship, service, and advocacy we will grow more and more into the full stature of our resurrected Christ, by whose name we become family one to another.


...one in five houses are vacant in Weinland Park and the near Southside

Trinity's Wardens, members of the Vestry, Treasurer, other parish leaders, staff and the clergy met on Saturday, April 18 to discuss the financial wellbeing of the church in the second annual Financial Summit.

During the Financial Summit the team:

- Reviewed parish assets and liabilities
- Analyzed the financial cost/mission benefit of Trinity's service and outreach offerings
- Generated short, mid and long-range goals for service offerings and financial health
- Discussed revenue generation opportunities
- Shared cost-cutting ideas



I would like to invite all of the wonderful and supportive people of Trinity Church to witness this very special event in my life. Your presence will add to the joy of the day.


