RECTOR'S REFLECTION

- THE REV. RICHARD A. BURNETT

Dear People of Trinity Church:

Recently, I learned that churches and other non-governmental organizations that are not strictly speaking profit-making should resist the term "not-for-profit" in referring to themselves. The concern is that this easy fitting category falsely describes us as either incapable of, or unconcerned with, careful financial management. Your vestry and I can testify that this simply is not the case for our parish's responsible stewardship.

The preferred term is "social sector." Yet this still seems somewhat narrow in describing our common ministry and core purposes. Rather, I suggest "relational and transformational" as a better lens through which we might see our operations.

No more compelling illustration of this relational and transformational ("R/T") spirit can be found in the stories of Holy Women & Holy Men than that of the Cheyenne Christian convert, deacon and missionary, David Pendleton Oakerhater (d. 1931).

Imprisoned by the U.S. army in the 19th century,
this bold Native American warrior was befriended by
a U.S. Army captain who taught him about Jesus
Christ, aided financially by a wealthy Cincinnati
Episcopalian named Mrs. Pendleton—for whom he
was named in baptism, educated and ordained in
upstate New York, and ultimately served as a
missionary in Native American communities in
Oklahoma until his death.

We remember this extraordinary person and give thanks for his life on September 1 each year. We know that his story is deeply rooted in a larger "R/T" story of those who offered a bit of themselves for him and others. Contemporary author Sam Portaro puts it well:

"This story is not the achievement of institutions; this story is remarkable, at least in part, for what it says of the power or relational ministry, that ministry evidenced in Jesus' own deployment and his disciples....

[T]he life and ministry of David Pendleton Oakerhater and his companions becomes a paradigm for modern ministry."

So, we really go beyond "for- or not-for-profit" distinctions. We even seem to be offering something more than a relieved and abetted "social sector." The church, by God's mercy, connects us to one another in Christ. We become "one in the Spirit, one in the Lord." And therefore, we become new always in Christ.

The writer of Proverbs (or at least the originator of this particular proverb) offers us a dire prediction to emphasize the wisdom and goodness of people coming together to work for the common good. To the same end my mother, in a much more positive vain, would often cite the folk wisdom of the Shakers with the reminder to me that "Many hands make light the heart and the work."

This Fall at Trinity Church we will be working toward reactivating and developing new Ministry Teams focused on the areas of Hospitality - Worship, Music, and Arts -Parish Life - Christian Formation - Pastoral Ministries and Community Ministries. Each of these main areas contain within them areas of special interest - (e.g. Hospitality includes but not limited to Ushers (aka: "Westies"), Fellowship Hour scheduling and organization, Special events, wedding volunteers).

These Ministry Teams are being developed as outlets for the creativity of the members as well as having oversight

FROM DEACON JOAN GRANT...

In August, I flew to Mexico City, and then took a bus to the city of Cuernavaca, where I lived for two weeks with a Mexican couple in their working class home, and participated in a Spanish immersion program designed for ministry. Each day we went to the language school, where we had classes from 9 to 12 or 2. Then, we would take a bus back up the giant hill/mountain for "la comida," the main meal of the day, with the family. Most days, we climbed a big hill to take the bus back to school for a "charla," a lecture on culture, politics or religion, or took an

Mago and Tito Santamaria have been hosting students in their home for about 30 years; they know how to do it! They built their home with their own hands, almost entirely, carrying huge rocks and boulders up this tremendous hill. It took them about 4 years of working on weekends and evenings, because they could not afford to do it any other way. They also built the street in front of their house, and the sewage and water systems. Before building their house, they lived in cartons and washed their clothes in the river.

They still wash their clothes outside, using a ceramic washboard, a cistern and bar soap. I tried this out, and quickly realized it is arduous and time-consuming work!

Tito's daughter and her family, along with his 87-year-old mother, live across the street. The grandmother came over every morning and washed our breakfast dishes.

Fresh fruit is plentiful and delicious in Cuernavaca; we ate many tortillas and beans, as well as fresh pineapple, watermelon, mango and papaya. One of my favorites was cactus salad!

70% of the Mexican people live in poverty; there is no government assistance, even for severely handicapped people. Families take care of their own. Most people we met hate the impact of NAFTA on Mexico, and want to see it renegotiated. Because of NAFTA, corn is now being imported into Mexico from Iowa and Nebraska, and Mexican farmers can no longer make a living.

We studied a good deal about Christian-based communities, Latin America's revitalization of the church. These communities originated in Cuernavaca, and have spread all through Latin America. Many people participate in these house churches, meeting in people's homes, building community, advocating for their needs, and caring for one another, though not many of them attend the Roman Catholic Church.

Because the Spanish invaders in the 16th century did not wipe out the indigenous peoples, there are many remaining indigenous groups living in Mexico, trying to preserve their identity and dignity, especially in the southern rural areas. We visited a couple of towns with strong indigenous history, as well as several Mayan and Aztec ruins. One Aztec ruin in Mexico City, El Templo Mayor, was just discovered in the late 1960's by a city electrical worker. It is now a huge city block or more of 12-14th century pyramids and ruins, right in the heart of the city. (Perhaps Columbus could take a cue, and excavate under City Center! Who knows what we might find!)



GENERAL CONVENTION REGIONAL REPORTING SESSIONS
